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WEARING HEADSCARVES... **THE RIGHT IS OURS!**

EUROPEAN BAN ON WEARING ISLAMIC HEADSCARVES AND OTHER RELIGIOUS SYMBOLS WON'T APPLY IN BRITAIN!

It was said to be a sad day for justice and equality by the Muslim council of Britain, as the judges concluded that asking all employees to dress neutrally does not break religious discrimination rules.

Furthermore the European court of justice ruled that prohibiting the visible wearing of any political or religious sign does not constitute direct discrimination.

However all experts have been warned that the ban is not as simple as they think, it won't be easy to implement in the UK. Also, employers would have to go through Europe which is not possible until the country leaves the EU.

It was stated by some Muslim women that they are against the idea of banning headscarves as it's breaching their rights to express their religious beliefs freely.

It was also stated by the judges that an employee could not simply be dismissed simply because a customer took offence at seeing a headscarf, as that will lead to stereotyping and further discrimination which the courts

are trying to stay away from.

But there has been a debate raised on the Islamic garments for instance the face covering burka has been outlawed in public in several countries. So therefore, banning headscarves is leading Muslims to thinking they are being discriminated against as all their religious institutions are being banned, which is going against their religious beliefs.

Implementing dress neutrality policies is extremely difficult, and in most cases, not realistic in the modern workplace which leads to people going against the new implementations put forward by the courts and different governing bodies.

Also, any organisation wanting to adopt such a policy must give serious thought to how it would be implemented and viewed by employees, because if they get it **WRONG**, this could easily lead to employers taking on a discrimination case.

NHS MISPLACED HALF A MILLION DOCUMENTS!

On the 27th of February the NHS England completed an investigation on whether any patients have been harmed by an administrative mix-up. They have found 500,000 documents that contain medical information, including cancer test results that were “mistakenly put in storage instead of sending it to the GP or filled in the patients record”. An investigation is being done for the 2,500 patients who need further medical checks.

BBC News said that the problem that has been causing this is the fact that “a mail redirection company hired by the NHS failed to pass on documents that had either been incorrectly addressed or needed re-routing because the patient had moved to a new GP surgery”. This is not the first time that the NHS has failed; this

had also took place in 2011 in the East Midlands, The Southwest and North East London.

Jeremy Hunt, who is the Health Secretary, said that, “The news is heart-breaking for the families involved, hospitals and GPs are doing their best to deliver services despite being neglected by the government. We urgently need to know how this was allowed to happen. How many have been harmed, and whether patients remain in risk.”

However, Jeremy Hunt first disclosed the data error in July 2016, but, at that time Jeremy had not said how many primary care patients had been affected.



WHAT DO WE THINK?

JASON WILLIAMSON OF THE MU FOUNDATION

What's it like to work for Manchester United?

Don't you ever remember just being yourself and being able to do anything you wanted to?

When you didn't have to stress over exams like your life depended on it? When you didn't give a second thought about what snapchat filter would look better on you? When you didn't need to think much about taking up a professional job?

And that's exactly what we got out of Jason Williamson when we interviewed him on the 31st of March. He answered all our questions with a delightful smile.

Before we ask you the questions would you like to introduce yourself and tell us a little bit about what you do around Whalley range and Levenshulme?

JW: Well my names Jason Williamson, I work for the Manchester United Foundation and I am going to be based here and in Levenshulme for the next 3 years. Then obviously if I do a good job, hopefully that will be a little bit longer. My role is to work with disengaged pupils and get them engaged and motivated for school and their future

How did football become your biggest interest?

JW: From a young age I was always around sports, my dad was in the army so he travelled around a lot and

I always remembered that he was very focused on football and tennis as sports is massive in the armed forces. So from a very, very young age I was always kicking up all around and doing those types of things, from there I was just football mad. Then when we moved back to the UK when I was 5 I just got stuck into playing for teams, I got my family and cousins who were fans of Manchester United and I became enthusiastic about football and just got into it.

What are your other hobbies/interests apart from football?

JW: Tennis; I've always been a tennis player I love my tennis, recently I've started taking up snowboarding, it's something totally different it's always something I looked at and thought it looks really cool so I thought of giving it a go, I haven't done it in a little while but I want to get back into it. Music: I love my music, and on the other extreme of snowboarding I love walks, I will go to places like the Lake District and find a route and spend 5 to 6 hours walking with a backpack on.

What kind of music are you into?

Well I've had some of the girls comment on my music taste they just think I'm being an older guy. I grew up listening to Tupac and a lot of other things but mostly Rap and RnB.





If your career wasn't evolved around teaching what would you do instead and why?

JW: I struggle to think with this one because you know any young man growing up wants to be a professional footballer, but you know so did I. But from there when I kind of knew that wasn't going to happen, I started coaching so I got into that kind of teaching/coaching role and that's all within something. When I thought about this question honestly I thought I would go and work for the World Animal Protection; if you could throw me into a jungle with some orangutans and something living in a sanctuary, I would absolutely love that. I'm a big animal person so I would love to work for an organisation like that, I may be seen as a hippie but I would love to be in the middle of nowhere and just look after some animals.

Who would you say is your inspiration and why?

JW: Growing up in a sporting way David Beckham was my inspiration simply because I played his position so I bought his boots and I had my hair done in the same way he did. You know if he shaved his head I would do the same and if he got a Mohawk I would get a Mohawk too. Zinedine Zidane was my kind of footballing aspiration, I looked at him thought I like the way he plays and that's what I want to do. But generally it would be my family, my mum, dad and my brother; they gave me a work ethic and those type of skills that I couldn't have got from anywhere else. I look at them like wow they're definitely mine.

What are your future aspirations?

JW: Apart from being a millionaire, I would like to exceed in my job role, and I would also like to open up my own business. I would quite like to open up a bar with my name above it. I'm not 100% sure because I mean I did own a business before and it's a lot of hard work but it's very much obviously what you put into it you get out of it, and I know that's the same with any job but it's even more when you own it.

So far what's been your most embarrassing moment?

JW: This I found difficult as I don't easily get embarrassed at all, growing up I've always been a bit of a joker so if



something embarrassing happened I just go along with it, so I've not really got like a embarrassing moment. I have daft stories but nothing to do with me getting embarrassed, I just don't get embarrassed I guess it's simple as that. You just roll with it, I mean if something daft does happen and people laugh at it just laugh with them. It's the simplest form of not getting bothered and just laugh at yourself.

Can you tell us a fact about yourself that no one else knows?

JW: I've met quite a few of the first Manchester United team and obviously Bobby Charlton who's a massive hero. I used to run a night club that's kind of like the reason why I like that kind of owning something. I used to run a night club which was a completely different role to what I do now. The reason I changed to the job I'm currently doing is because I just got bored of working at night and there wasn't any fulfilment in working in a bar, I wanted to go home and feel like I've made a difference for people. I've travelled a little bit, and I would like to travel Europe and America a little bit more.

What piece of advice would you give to girls our age about career choices and the future?

JW: Don't worry about it too much and have a goal but don't worry if the plan changes. I think when a lot of pressure is put on you, you know what you want to be when you grow up, like these grades matter and this grade matters, you know there is a lot of pressure put on pupils from a young age, like you need to reach a certain level in order to exceed. I think as long as you're moving and not just stood still you're alright, like my path. I wasn't always moving forward sometimes you move a couple of steps back, sometimes you take a side way step, but at least your moving and you'll find that even when you take a couple of steps back or side steps your still gaining some experience which eventually propels you forward. I'm 28 and I've only just fell into a role that I now love, even though I was told at 21 when I came out of university 'You're going to get into this job and that's going to be your future career'. It doesn't work out like that; I was in a completely different role from what I'm doing now, and obviously I was thinking well what's going to happen and where am I going to be and what am I going to do and eventually it all does fall into place. I had a goal but my path was all over; but I would say don't change your goal just adapt your plan sometimes, don't worry and don't put too much pressure on yourself.

HIDDEN FIGURES

Hidden Figures was released in the UK on 17th February 2017 and is based on a true story. For those that do not know the basis of the film is about a trio of African American women, called Katherine Goble Johnson (Taraji P. Henson), Dorothy Vaughan (Octavia Spencer) and Mary Jackson (Janelle Monáe) that worked at NASA during the 1960's. The movie shows the journey of racism to equality of which each of the women had to encounter and experience. Not only that, it shows us that they had experienced sexism, so not only did

they battle with racism but sexism as well.

Like I mentioned before they worked at NASA during the 1960's. Overall, the movie showed the problems faced by the three women and what they did to overcome it. Since its release 'Hidden Figures' has been nominated for many awards and has triumphed in the box office.

NOKIA 3310 IT'S BACK!

THE ICONIC, INDESTRUCTIBLE PHONE HAS BEEN REDESIGNED 17 YEARS AFTER IT FIRST LAUNCHED.

The new Nokia 3310 is said to be smaller, sleeker and reportedly has 22 hours of talk time with a one-month battery life on standby. And, of course, it comes with Snake.

After the phone was revealed, everybody got the urge to buy the new phone and can't wait till it's released. Does this mean bye bye iPhone's and Samsung's and hello to the new nokia phones?

It is available in gloss red and yellow and matte blue and grey, the Nokia 3310 has a 2.4-inch colour screen, Bluetooth 3.0, an FM radio, LED torch, microSD card support up to 32GB and has a two-megapixel camera. The 2.5G connection even lets you go online –to access Twitter, Facebook and other services through the Opera Mini browser.

The handset is noticeably slimmer than the original Nokia 3310, which sold around 126 million units before it was discontinued in 2005. It's also almost half the weight – the original was 133g; the new one is 79g. The Nokia 3310 will be sold worldwide as a "digital detox" phone.

Priced at €49 (£41) the phone has a release date set for the second quarter of 2017.


